SETTING THE SCENE TENNIS FACILITIES IN NSW

- 3,675 public tennis courts in NSW
- 65% of courts synthetic grass and 88% of all NSW facilities less than 8 courts
- 560 organized tennis clubs and centres operated by volunteers, coaches and centre managers
- 3,500 volunteers and 1,200 qualified tennis coaches
- Facility footprint across all 152 Local Councils (metro, regional, rural)
- Backlog of facility investment and increased pressures and expectations on facility managers and committees
- Changing management models as volunteering decreases and community expectations rise

Approx. 71 tennis courts across 16 facilities in the Gosford LGA

WORKING TOGETHER TO GROW TENNIS IN GOSFORD



ROLE OF CLUBS, ASSOCIATIONS, COACHES AND COUNCIL

Collectively we must all know our roles and work in partnership to deliver tennis in Gosford.

This can be achieved through:

- Delivering on the four pillars (next slide)
- Knowing and abiding to the expectations and responsibilities under your tenure agreements – both Tennis and Council
- Continue to grow tennis in Gosford through excellent delivery of tennis services, not just for today but for our future generations



OUR 4 PILLARS: ENSURING SUCCESSFUL TENNIS VENUES IN ALL OF NSW



ACCESSIBILITY

An accessible venue is one which is both physically and economically accessible and open to all members of the public. Physically, the tennis venue is accessible during reasonable operating hours and preferably with a physical point of contact on site. Tennis venues on public land should be open to the community (including non-members of the club) to hire and use on a casual or pay for play basis. An adequate distribution and mix of accessible tennis venues that offer programing and services that meet the needs of local communities and provide a range of tennis programming entry points is central to venue access.



SUSTAINABILITY

A sustainable tennis venue is financially viable into the foreseeable future. A sustainable tennis venue successfully implements an asset maintenance and replacement plan and is not overly reliant on external sources of funding to meet its basic infrastructure needs. It derives funds from a range of activities, putting aside operational surpluses each year to service its sinking fund to cover asset replacement, maintenance and upgrades. The clubhouse, courts and surrounds are upheld to a good standard creating a vibrant, safe and welcoming facility. Environmentally sustainable practices are also part of a sustainable venue's fabric and operations.



COMMUNITY BENEFIT

Community benefit should be a fundamental purpose of any tennis venue. Community benefit can be defined as any value that the public derives from the venue. Venues and associated improvement projects should demonstrate alignment with the strategic directions of the national tennis community, government and community partners and can clearly support increased community participation and have the capacity to provide health, active lifestyle and social benefits, inclusive practices and mix of program opportunities.



ACCOUNTABILITY

Accountability of venue operators means that they take appropriate responsibility for the asset, its ongoing sustainability and ensure that the future of the tennis venue is secured. They implement sound business and financial planning and reporting practices. The operational responsibilities of the venue are clear and measures are in place to meet the targets and goals set by stakeholders to ensure that obligations are met.

GOSFORD CITY COUNCIL: LICENCE POLICY AND TENNIS

There are a number of aspects of the current Licence Policy that Tennis is working in partnership with Council to resolve.

These include but not limited to:

- Best form of tennis venue tenure arrangement and length of terms
- Clarification around the 50% revenue requirement
- How the services of the coach are applied under the licence policy
- Asset maintenance, renewal and responsibility creating sustainable venues collectively with in partnership with Council
- Long term renewal of courts and tennis infrastructure

OUR NEXT STEPS – TENNIS AND GOSFORD CITY COUNCIL

Tennis NSW and Tennis Australia will continue to work in partnership with Gosford City to achieve the following over the next 12 months:

- Clarify specific requirements of the Licence Policy
- A review of management and tenure arrangements at all venues
- Commence the development of a Gosford Council Tennis Strategy
- Commence a plan for tennis venue renewal and development
